9:00 a.m. – Chair Hillock opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance and prayer.

Acceptance of Outdoor Arena Bid - Wallowa County Fair

Commissioner Hillock advised three bids were received. After review of the bids and products, the selected bid belongs to W-W Manufacturing, which was also the least expensive bid received.

Commissioner Nash moved to accept the proposed bid from W-W Manufacturing Commissioner Roberts seconded the motion

Acceptance of Request for Qualifications Contract Manager/General Contractor – Wallowa County Fair

Commissioner Hillock recused himself from voting on this item.

Commissioner Roberts advised the request for qualifications was sent out a few weeks ago, advertising in newspapers and several other sites for contractors who would want to be a CM/GC for the rehabilitation of the county fairgrounds. One submission was received by the deadline: Wellens General Contractors.

Commissioner Roberts motioned to accept the Wellens submission and to set in place the meetings with them to determine what the scope of work will be Commissioner Nash seconded the motion

Commissioner Nash moved to approve the Consent Agenda Commissioner Roberts seconded the motion.

Agenda Items:

Poppleton vs. Wallowa County - Discussion on LUBA remand

Paige Sully advised the above-named case has been remanded from the Land Use Board of Appeals (LUBA) to Wallowa County for additional proceedings. Ms. Sully received a letter this morning with Mr. Ellis' position on behalf of Ms. Poppleton. Both Mr. Hostetter and Mr. Ellis interpret the ruling to provide this has been remanded for Wallowa County to re-open the record and take additional testimony or evidence on the two relevant findings that were the basis of the assignments of errors. Ms. Sully stated she does not necessarily agree with that. In Ms. Sully's review of the ruling, the ruling is not that there was insufficient evidence in the record, but that the findings do not reflect the record; the findings are not drafted correctly. Ms. Sully believes the matter was remanded for the findings to be supplemented, amended, or redrafted.

The commissioners may schedule a hearing, providing notice to the relevant parties, taking additional evidence and testimony on the two issues which the matter was remanded on. Ms. Sully does not believe the Board of Commissioners is required to hold another hearing.

Mr. Ellis has requested the matter be remanded to the Planning Commission. Ms. Sully does not recommend doing so, given the decision of the Planning Commission was overturned by the Board of Commissioners.

Based on the recommendation of councel, Commissioner Nash made a motion to remand back to the Planning Commission. There was no second on the motion.

Ms. Sully advised that was not her recommendation. Her recommendation was for the Board of Commissioners to continue to entertain this matter. Commissioner Nash stated he had misunderstood the recommendation.

Commissioner Roberts moved to request the attorney for the applicant take the matter back and flesh out the three reasons the matter was returned, which was deficient findings, not that the decision was bad.

Mr. Ellis commented virtually and believes there is insufficiency of evidence in the record that is explained in the decision by LUBA. Mr. Ellis thinks it is appropriate to hold a de novo hearing on this issue prior to new findings being prepared for the Board's consideration. Mr. Ellis does not think the evidence exists in the record to support the decision the Board reached.

Commissioner Hillock advised Commissioner Nash's motion will be withdrawn for lack of a second. Commissioner Roberts restated her motion at the request of Commissioner Nash.

Commissioner Roberts moved to request the attorney for the applicant review and flesh out the findings he submitted in lieu of holding a de novo hearing

Ms. Sully, in speaking to Mr. Ellis' position, believes if LUBA held there was inadequate evidence in the record, LUBA would not have remanded but would have granted the appeal.

Commissioner Nash seconded the motion The vote: Commissioner John Hillock – aye Commissioner Todd Nash – aye Commissioner Susan Roberts - aye

Daniel Park clarified with the commissioners the decision will go to Mr. Park's attorney with no further evidence being submitted, using only the existing record.

Ms. Sully advised she will draft the letter to Mr. Park's council outlining the decision made today, asking him to prepare and present amended findings. Ms. Sully suggested a follow-up of this matter be on the agenda the first meeting in April.

Mr. Ellis confirmed he preserved adequately his objection to "that" process/procedure given the language of the opinion of LUBA. Commissioner Roberts thanked him.

Order 2023-002 - Vacation of a portion of River Way, Imnaha, Wallowa County, Oregon Commissioner Roberts advised she has worked with the applicant on this and has spoken with the Forest Service who has no interest in this one way or the other. This piece of land has a small cabin on it. All the surrounding landowners approve of the vacation.

Commissioner Roberts moved to vacate the small portion of land that doesn't seem to belong to anything

Commissioner Nash seconded the motion

Wallowa County Weed Board Annual Update - Highlighting 2022 accomplishments and Plans & Projects for 2023 Teresa Smergut, chair of the Wallowa County Weed Board started off thanking their partners and stating some of the projects and community information outreaches they have done. Ms. Smergut named the members of the Weed Board and continued with the PowerPoint presentation (attached). Andy Marcum, Mike Beachy, Marci Schreder, Shanda Hyllested, Beckijo Wall and Mark Porter all shared their part of the presentation in correspondence with the PowerPoint.

Brief discussion took place during and after the presentation and the commissioners thanked the presenters and thanked all the attendees for coming and for the work they do.

Other Business:

2023 Title II Funds Wallowa-Whitman National Forest – Katy Nesbitt discussed the Project Application presented at the Natural Resource Advisory Committee (NRAC) tech meeting in February. The application was updated and presented to the standing committee yesterday and is now before the Board of Commissioners. The request is for approximately \$80,000. If the commissioners approve of the ranking of projects, the list will be uploaded and hand delivered to the supervisor of the Wallowa-Whitman National Forest in Baker.

Commissioner Nash moved to put all the available funds into the Cayuse Project which has been one of our highest priorities

Commissioner Roberts seconded the motion

Ms. Nesbit affirmed that is how it will be presented to the Forest Service and all the proper channels. Ms. Nesbit also stated with Commissioner Nash, John Williams, and possibly other local constituents attending the NE Oregon RAC meeting, we will have people in the room and virtually to talk to the project and champion this request. Commissioner Hillock also stated there will be funding, approximately \$40,000, from Kyle Hogrefe's doctorate work, made available from Texas Agricultural and Mechanical University. Commissioner Roberts said there is minimal funding the County can put forward to send somebody out this year to relocate the plots which would set the Forest Service ahead of schedule when this funding becomes available in 2024. Commissioner Roberts also stated she is pleased with the capable people which are a part of this process to defend Wallowa County's Title II submission this year.

There was no further business.


